Anne Sullivan is the Principal of Sullivan | Preservation in Chicago, Illinois where she practices as a preservation architect. She has served as adjunct faculty in the M.S. Historic Preservation Program at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago for over fifteen years. She teaches courses in historic building materials, building pathology, sustainable practices in preservation and preserving buildings of the recent past. Anne holds both a BA in Art History and a BS in Architecture from the University of Illinois at Urbana, and an MS in Historic Preservation from Columbia University with a concentration in building material conservation. She has served on the Illinois Historic Sites Advisory Council and is a recipient of the Francis J. Plym Traveling Fellowship from the University of Illinois School of Architecture, a mid-career grant, through which she studied the history and development of reinforced concrete in central Europe. She is a past recipient of the Nathan Clifford Ricker Award for excellence in teaching from the Illinois Chapter of the American Institute of Architects. Anne writes and speaks frequently on architecture and historic preservation topics.

Specialty Areas: Anne's practice has focused on restoration with an emphasis on assessment of building conditions, material conservation and documentation, and has authored numerous Historic Structure Reports and Preservation Feasibility Plans. She has a particular interest in the History of Building Technology.

APT Roles: Prior to serving as the APT President; Anne served as the co-chair of the APT Publications Committee for four years where she helped launch the *Practice Points* publication.
